corroborating to make any installation of fracking wells in Brazil unfeasible and prohibiting the activity in the states of Paraná and Santa Catarina by state bill:

- International recognition by Columbia Law School as an example of innovation with the Direct Action of Unconstitutionality (ADI) filed in 2022 against the Fair Energy Transition Law, pointing to greenwashing and unconstitutionality by encouraging the maintenance of subsidies for coal-fired power generation;
- Presence in more than 20 public auctions promoted by the ANP and CNPE with a counterpoint to the expansion of oil and gas on the Brazilian coast, removing more than 1,354 oil and gas blocks, between onshore and offshore;
- Recent articulation, with 80 subscribing organizations, to seek to stop the advance of the oil frontier at the mouth of the Amazon River;
- Intense mobilization and handling of public civil actions (ACPs) in the face of auctions and environmental licensing of gas thermoelectric plants, ports and LNG terminals, including the advancement of 12 thermoelectric plants and a gas HUB, just on the coast of the state of Rio de Janeiro;
- Presentation at COP 27 (2022) of a Booklet prepared jointly with the Oil
 Workers Union of RJ and research groups from UFRJ and USP on the
 guiding principles of the Fair Energy Transition of Petroleum and aims to
 sensitize and raise awareness of government officials and people in the public
 sphere who elaborate public policies, press and sector workers and unions.

B. Interest in matters under consideration by the Assembly

13. Briefly outline how your organization intends to demonstrate its interest in matters under consideration by the Assembly, including by answering questions 14 to 17 and by providing any other relevant information related to the application for observer status.

Brazil, due to its continental size, has an extensive coastal area, in which conflicting economic activities of national and international interest coexist with the region of greatest occupation in the country. The main cities and the highest population density are located on the Brazilian coast, as well as important concentrations of traditional communities such as fishermen's colonies, quilombola and indigenous communities that still live in a traditional way and have artisanal fishing as their main source of nutrition and income.

Also on the Brazilian coast there are different formations with an impressive geo and biodiversity, such as Atol de Rocas, Fernando de Noronha Island, Trindade, the coral reefs of Foz do Amazonas and an immense area of mangroves, all of great importance for the maintaining biodiversity and absorbing atmospheric carbon.

On the other hand, the large extension of the Brazilian coast, added to its geodiversity, also promotes the occurrence of mineral deposits of great interest, which have been prospected with greater intensity in recent years. This intensification has caused Arayara's concern from a socio-environmental point of view.

We are a Brazilian institution that has the capacity to support ISA as an observer and we see the urgency and need for care for the coast of Brazil. We emphasize that we do not have Brazilian institutions that are currently part of the ISA.

14. Briefly outline whether and how the purposes or activities of the organization relate to the work of the Authority.

Traditionally, the Arayara International Institute acts in defense of life and the Brazilian coastal and marine environment, focusing on the preservation of its biodiversity and on the way of life of traditional communities that obey the balance of the riverside region for their subsistence, such as fishermen and shellfish gatherers. collectors. Aiming at a fair and sustainable energy transition, Arayara has been observing closely for 30 years and making an important counterpoint to the oil and gas sector and the expansion of exploratory environments, which in recent years have intensified in sensitive areas such as Atol das Rocas, Fernando de Noronha, Abrolhos, Foz do Amazonas, among several other areas of coral reefs and mangroves of extreme importance for marine conservation, maintenance of biodiversity and offsetting carbon emissions into the atmosphere. It should be noted that these areas have also been the focus of marine mining studies.

We observe with great apprehension the progress of mineral prospecting along the entire Brazilian coast, with important discoveries for the deepwater mining sector, as large and important as the Clarion-Clipperton Zone. One of these is the rise of the Rio Grande in the Pelotas Sedimentary Basin, which is the third largest area of world importance ever discovered for marine mining.

Many of the minerals prospected in the deep waters of the Brazilian coast are being presented as necessary for the construction of high-tech equipment, important for the Just Energy Transition - flag of Arayara.org.

Thus, the Arayara International Institute aims to monitor and observe the progress of research and development in the regulation of mineral exploration in these areas of great importance for marine and coastal ecosystems, as well as for the way of life of Brazilian coastal communities, to guarantee the application of science, sustainability and governance to communities and ecosystems. Because, we have the responsibility to monitor so as not to lose sight of our commitments to socio-environmental justice.

Arayara.org aims to support data collection and research on the Brazilian coast, with the development of regulations to minimize the impacts of mining activity on marine ecosystems and coastal communities in Brazil and Latin America that could be affected by inadequate environmental risk assessment. Our intention is to promote the discussion with the scientific opinion of relevant actors in the region, and with the opinion of our technicians with the support of the current state of science and best available institutional practices.

With 30 years of activity, Arayara has demonstrated its experience in environmental protection and its commitment to life, science and socio-environmental justice. Our organization combines legal advocacy with education and social mobilization. And it works in partnership with other national and international organizations for the development of its campaigns in connection with the partners. We also work in partnership with the main Brazilian universities, fostering high-level discussion environments between technicians and scientists in the area.
